The first home was loaded and delivered to a veteran in Kentucky after we completed the walls. The second went to Lorena, a single mom in Zanesville, and her two children. Some from our church were able to travel with the walls and personally meet Lorena during the construction of her home. 

Coming Through the Battlefield


